-RULES-

ORGANIZATION

1. Two panels, each consisting of five members, compete in a 30-minute session.
2. A moderator reads each question aloud, and may repeat the question to both panels. The first panel member who raises his/her hand is given the opportunity to answer the question. If the answer is incorrect, any member of the opposing panel is given the opportunity to answer.
3. The moderator may be assisted by one or two judges who rule on which panelist raised his/her hand first. In case of ties, neither panel may answer the question and the question is discarded. Judges may also be used in keeping score.

QUESTIONS

1. Questions are worth 5, 10, and 15 points. If the question is answered correctly, the points are added to the answering team's score. **If the question is answered incorrectly, the points are awarded to the opposing team's score.** The opposing team then has the option of answering the missed question. If answered correctly, they receive the point value of the question for a total of two times the regular point value. If the answer was incorrect, they then lose the points awarded when the first team answered incorrectly.
2. Panelists have 10 seconds to answer and only the first answer is accepted. Prior to answering, panelists may not confer or discuss the question.
3. An answer is judged correct if it is analogous to the answer provided.

GAME FORMAT

1. The moderator starts with a 5-point question. Whichever panel member raises his/her hand first may try answering the question. If his/her answer is correct, the team is awarded 5 points and the moderator proceeds with a 10-point question; then, if answered correctly, a 15-point question.
2. Whenever a question has been answered incorrectly or left unanswered, or a 15-point question has been answered correctly, the moderator will start again with a 5-point question.
3. If the same panel answers three questions in a row correctly for 5, 10, then 15 points, that team is awarded a 15-point bonus.
4. The *Quiz Game* proceeds for a fixed time period, generally 30-minutes, and the panel accumulating the most points is declared the winner.
5. The moderator may modify the rules to fit the particular situation, i.e., the number of panelists on a team, the 30-minute time limit, or the number of teams competing. Regardless of the organization, it is essential that the *Quiz Game* remains competitive in nature.
